# From Dog Plumbing to Systems Neuroscience and Back Again

Nicholas D. Jeffery is a graduate of the University of Bristol, in England. Following graduation, he worked at a charity-funded veterinary clinic, a private small animal practice, and at a specialty referral practice. He undertook PhD and post-doctoral training in various neuroscience laboratories. He has also served as a faculty member with two university veterinary departments and is currently a professor of neurology and neurosurgery at the Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine. His clinical and research interests include neurology, neurosurgery and neuroscience, most specifically how the damaged nervous system responds to injury, how function may be restored, and how this response can be measured through translational studies in dogs. He is also currently engaged in a master's course in clinical trials through the University of London's School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine with the goal of developing multi-center veterinary clinical trials and epidemiological investigations.
